Name of Service:

St Luke's Radiation Oncology Network (SLRON)

The Health Service Executive (HSE) is a large organisation of over 100,000 people, whose job is to run all of the public health services in Ireland. The HSE is committed to ensuring that the children and young people who avail of our services are safe from harm.

Description of service and activities provided: St. Luke's Radiation Oncology Network (SLRON) was established in 2010. It operates from three Dublin locations – St Luke's Hospital, Rathgar and St Luke's Radiation Oncology Units in St James's and Beaumont Hospitals. Under the Health (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 2010, St. Luke's Hospital, Rathgar became part of the HSE and later part of the St. Luke's Radiation Oncology Network. There are also two transition units under the governance of St. James's and Tallaght Hospitals on the grounds of Rathgar location SLRON provides radiotherapy, chemotherapy and palliative care to adult and child patients diagnosed with a variety of cancers. It also provides a range of psychosocial supports to adult and child patients and their families as well as a range of other services such as physiotherapy, dietetics, speech and language therapy. SLRON is committed to creating a culture that promotes the welfare of children and young people availing of services across the network. It is also committed to promoting the welfare the children of adult patients attending the services as well as children visiting adult patients. SLRON is a provider of relevant services under Schedule 1. 1(c) of the Children First Act 2015 (any hospital, hospice, healthcare centre or other centre which receives, treats or otherwise provides physical or mental health services to children).

HSE Principles to safeguard children from harm:

The safety, welfare and development of children and young people are core objectives and key priorities of the HSE. The following principles are informed by Children First Guidance and legislation and support our intention to keep children safe from harm:

- The best interests of the child should be paramount.
- The safety and welfare of children is everyone's responsibility.
- Children have a right to be heard, listened to and to be taken seriously. Taking account of their age and understanding, they should be consulted and involved in all matters and decisions that may affect their lives.
- All children must be treated equally and have the right to be protected from discrimination, intolerance, harassment and bullying.
- Child protection is a multi-agency, multidisciplinary activity. Agencies and professionals must work together in the best interests of children.
